

Summary



- Goal: Assess and understand Northern
 California farmworkers' perceptions of wildfires and their impacts on work.
- From May 25 to July 31, surveys were distributed to farmworkers in Sonoma and Napa counties
- 97 surveys were completed







- Few respondents reported receiving information about county alerts and first aid.



Have you been affected by wildfires?




Where do you get information about wildfires?




Perceptions and experiences about wildfire policies

"Sometimes they told us that there were no more masks and that we should get it ourselves."

- Less than half (42.27%) reported requesting PPE while working during a wildfire.
- Among those who requested PPE, "some report that employers provide masks and educate employees on how to use them, while others report that they do not receive masks or have to bring their own masks to wear at work."
- More than two-thirds of respondents have not entered an evacuated area to carry out work (73.2%)
- Of those who responded working in conditions with visible wildfire smoke, (73.21%) worked for 8 hours or more.





Which of the following has happened to you while working as a farmworker in the United States?



Farmworker to Farmer


There were a total of 91 workers in the agriculture or vineyard industry interviewed by Líderes Campesinas' members in Sonoma County. We supplemented a more extensive survey about working conditions and fires with a couple of questions assessing their interest in starting their own farms. None of the respondents are current owners of an agricultural business, nonetheless about half showed interest in becoming one. Similarly, slightly more than half would like to be part of focus groups or training in this regard. The topics of highest value for the workers were Agriculture followed by other trade jobs and financial education.






National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio

- The message may be accompanied by a warning tone.










Land Access and Tenure for Limited Resource Farmers in Sonoma County

The study summarized aims to inform decision makers about the needs of limited resource farmers (LRFs) and recommend actions to support LRFs' success in Sonoma County.

What is a Limited Resource Farmer (LRF)?

• The term "limited resource farmer" refers farmers and ranchers who have limited access to the funds and other forms of capital needed to support development of a financially sustainable farming operation. Many of Sonoma County's local food and fiber producers are LRFs. These farmers are essential to building a vibrant, diverse agricultural sector, which provides multiple social, economic, and ecological benefits to the County.

Challenges for LRFs in Sonoma County

• In Sonoma County, availability of farmland is limited and the cost of land is very high. Combined with the high cost of living, this puts affordable land access and tenure out of reach for more LRFs. Sonoma County x. xcf. SzzzAgricultural Preservation and Open Space District and University of California Cooperative Extension are committed to supporting equitable land access, secure land tenure, and associated farm business viability for LRFs in the County.



Healing Land, Collective Power

Possibilities, Barriers, and Visions of Transforming Land, Work, and Ownership Towards Cooperative Agriculture for Ventura County Farmworkers

- Ventura County is one of the largest agricultural producing counties in the nation. Farming in our community is facing transformative changes in climate and labor and needs innovation to thrive in the 21st century. Investing in farmworkers to steward land of their own can create a better life for those whose labor feeds the world and a healthier community for all of us.
- MICOP, CAUSE, and Líderes Campesinas partnered from 2022-2024 to explore the opportunities and challenges of developing farmworker cooperatives and land trusts in Ventura County.








Guardian Vital





The Vinguard and Líderes Campesinas are collaborating on a wine label to draw attention to vineyard workers/stewards. Those who pick grapes are often in the shadows, are subjected to hazardous working conditions, and do not have job security or opportunities for advancement in the wine industry. The Guardian Vital label will be adopted by wineries for special cuvées. A percentage of sales from the cuvée will benefit Líderes Campesinas, an organization whose mission is to strengthen the leadership of farmworker women and youth so that they can be agents of economic, social, and political change and ensure their human rights. The participating wineries must guarantee that workers whose labor goes into making their wines have safe workspaces, are paid fairly, and are treated with dignity, respect, and potential.

Policy and Advocacy



- SB 1105: Paid Sick Time; Agricultural Employees; Emergencies
 - Would extend additional paid sick leave days related to weather disasters for California farmworkers.
- SB 227: Safety Net Unemployment Expansion: Excluded Workers Program
 - This bill would have required the EDD to develop a detailed plan for how a permanent unemployment benefits program for undocumented workers can be implemented.
- AB 408: Bonds for Climate Resilience
 - Proposes investments to create a healthier, more equitable, and climate-resilient agriculture and food system, with 50% of bonds going to farmers, ranchers, and communities of color.
- SB 1030: CWOP California Workplace Outreach Project
 - Seeks permanent funding for outreach and community engagement through nonprofits and other groups
- AB 1016: Latino and Indigenous Disparities Reduction Act
 - Requires state departments to collect and disaggregate data for indigenous Mesoamerican and Latino population groups in
 California
- Prop 4:
 - Authorizes bonds for drinking water, wildfire prevention, and protection of natural communities and land from climate risks.
- National Advocacy
 - Providing Farm Worker and Advocate Testimony and Recommendation to the National Advisory on Migrant Health
 - Advocating for a more inclusive and equitable Farm Bill.
